MINUTES

A meeting of the California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) Live Racing Committee was held at 10:30 A.M., Tuesday, February 28, 2023. The meeting was held via teleconference originating at the CARF office, 1776 Tribute Road, Sacramento, CA 95815.

CARF Live Racing Committee members joining by conference call: Jerome Hoban, Lauri King, Tom Martinez and Jim Morgan.

Agenda Item 1 – Public Comment. None.

Agenda Item 2 – Report, Discussion and Action, if any, on Humboldt County Fair Race Dates Overlap. Mr. Swartzlander reported that CARF maintains a position seeking two weeks of racing at Humboldt County Fair without concurrent racing at Golden Gate Fields (GGF), with the emphasis being placed on the second unallocated week (Aug. 23-29). Per California Horse Racing Board (CHRB) direction for the affected parties to reach a financial compromise, CARF has offered GGF and Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) principals a payment of \$125,000 in purse money for the second week, which is the estimated equivalent of 50% purse money generated that week. This offer has been declined.

Mr. Swartzlander stated GGF's position is that they require \$150,000 in commissions in return for not racing the second week and TOC's position is that GGF should race concurrently with Ferndale both weeks (complete overlap).

Mr. Swartzlander stated that if the parties come to the CHRB Board Meeting without reaching a compromise, it is likely the Board will allocate dates similar to 2022 (first week without overlap and second week with overlap). Mr. Swartzlander stated that the TOC has yet to send out a formal position.

Agenda Item 3 – Report, Discussion and Action, if any, on 2023 Purses. Mr. Swartzlander stated that the 2023 purse structure being proposed to the TOC includes: 1) keeping overnight purses at 2022 levels, 2) an additional stakes race at Pleasanton, possibly

creating the biggest day in fair racing, 3) stabling at Pleasanton and Sacramento June through August, and 4) raising purses \$38,000 at Ferndale in the event that they are allocated their second week of racing without overlap.

Mr. Doutrich reported on the current status of purses in California and stated that CARF's proposal puts the fairs in a strong position for summer racing.

Mr. Morgan stated that should Humboldt County Fair be allocated a second week without overlap, a \$38,000 purse increase is insufficient to incentivize horsemen to ship to Ferndale and the purses should be on parity with every other CARF racetrack, including upgrading the stakes races. Mr. Doutrich replied that he understands the concerns, but that the CARF purse structure requires approval from TOC, which is currently advocating for complete overlap at Ferndale and that getting approval for purse parity is not probable.

Mr. Swartzlander stated that he understands all of Mr. Morgan's concerns regarding Ferndale and that he suggests waiting for the result of the CHRB dates allocation before finalizing the proposal for the 2023 TOC Horsemen's Agreement.

Mr. Morgan brought up the age of GGF's synthetic racing surface and asked if there are plans to replace it and if its age and condition should be considered by the CHRB as reasons not to allocate an additional week to GGF. Mr. Swartzlander stated that he has not heard of official plans to replace the surface, but that David Duggan reported that amendments were added to the surface and that it is suitable for racing.

Mr. Hoban asked Mr. Doutrich to elaborate on the benefits of adding an additional stakes race to the closing day of Pleasanton and to provide the financial cost to the fair. Mr. Doutrich stated that the number one reason for this addition is "timing." Southern California is dark that week without racing, offering Pleasanton the opportunity to showcase the weekend to the local community as well as simulcast outlets and ADW platforms nationwide. This addition would improve the entire fair program and benefit all racing fairs. The concept is to create a "Mile Day" with a 10-race card, running 90% of the races at a mile or longer, potentially creating the biggest day in fair racing history.

Mr. Hoban asked about the fair's financial obligation if a \$150,000 stakes race is offered. Mr. Swartzlander replied that \$75,000 will come from the purse account with the fair being responsible for the \$75,000 balance if the consolidated purse account finishes in a negative position for the year. If the purse account generation can cover the \$150,000 while remaining in a positive position overall, there will be no obligation from the fair.

Mr. Swartzlander stated that while he would like to implement a day like this at all fairs, the circuit loses 30-40 head of quality horses when Del Mar opens. Pleasanton is uniquely positioned to capture those allowance and stakes level horses before they leave Northern

California. Mr. Morgan added that a day like this showcases the disparity in purse levels with Ferndale addressed earlier in the meeting. Mr. Doutrich stated that CARF staff will reevaluate the Ferndale marathon purse pending the outcome of the CHRB meeting.

Agenda Item 4 – Report, Discussion and Action, if any, on 2023 Racing Incentives. Mr. Swartzlander reported that a full list of proposed horsemen incentives is included in the meeting packet. The incentives are the same as those offered in 2022 (Trainer Start Incentive, Owner Start Incentive and Out-of-State Shipping Bonus), apart from requesting an additional \$300 for each runner at all fairs. These incentives require TOC approval.

Agenda Item 5 – Report, Discussion and Action, if any, on 2023 Auxiliary Stabling. Mr. Swartzlander stated that the 2023 plan is for fairs to remain self-sufficient regarding stabling with Pleasanton and Sacramento serving as alternate auxiliary sites June-August. Mr. Swartzlander recommended that CARF not provide auxiliary stabling to Santa Rosa and let them reach a stabling agreement with GGF.

Mr. Swartzlander stated that he will meet with Cal Expo staff to discuss auxiliary stabling costs at Sacramento and possible reductions.

Agenda Item 6 – Report, Discussion and Action, if any, on Horse Power Coalition Project. Mr. Swartzlander stated that racing industry principals have joined together with backstretch workers, jockeys, animal welfare advocates, fans and more to create the California Horse Power Coalition (CPHC) with the intent of preserving and protecting the equestrian culture in California. All tracks are participating in this public relations effort and TOC staff has requested CARF fairs join the cause for \$2,500 a month with a six-month commitment, which Mr. Swartzlander will approve unless there is objection from the group. No objections.

Mr. Morgan asked if there will be a follow-up meeting with GGF, TOC, CHRB staff and CARF regarding the upcoming CHRB meeting and dates allocation. Mr. Swartzlander requested delaying calling a meeting until TOC has provided a letter with their official position.

MINUTES

A concurrent meeting of the California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF) Board of Directors and Live Racing Committee was held at 11:00 A.M., Tuesday, March 14, 2023. The meeting was held via teleconference originating at the CARF office, 1776 Tribute Road, Sacramento, CA 95815.

Agenda Item 1 – Date, Time and Location of Next Meeting: The next CARF Board of Directors and Live Racing Committee meetings will be held Tuesday, April 4, 2023 via teleconference.

Agenda Item 2 – Public Comment. None.

Agenda Item 3 – Closed Session: Conference with Legal Counsel – Anticipated Litigation. Item deferred.

Agenda Item 4 – Approval of Minutes. {ACTION} Ms. King moved to approve the February 7, 2023 CARF Board of Directors & Live Racing Committee concurrent meeting minutes as presented. Mr. Jacobs seconded, unanimously approved.

Agenda Item 5 – Report, Discussion and Action, if any, on Legislative Program. Item deferred.

Agenda Item 6 – Report, Discussion and Action, if any, on Fantasy Sports and Timeline for Calypso Challenge. Mike Knapp presented an overview of Calypso Challenge included in the meeting packet titled, “Calypso Challenge Fantasy Sports.” Mr. Knapp

highlighted the fact that fantasy sports has gained legal acceptance as “skilled game contests” and is not sports betting. Calypso Challenge is adapted to the horse racing pari-mutuel system platform, with results based on an athlete’s fantasy scoring in live-game performances. A contest will include a field of athletes, such as+ 10 Quarterbacks, in place of 10 horses, and the participants will dictate the odds through entry fees paid on their contest selections.

Mr. Knapp stated that Pegasus Communications has made progress in developing the graphics package for football, which can then be modified for other sports. Mr. Swartzlander reported negotiations are ongoing with tote provider BetMakers’ Global Tote.

Mr. Swartzlander presented a timeline for implementing Calypso Challenge at the CARF Satellite Network, including a beta test at Cal Expo in June and an initial launch August 1 at Pleasanton, San Mateo, Cal Expo, Lake Perris and San Jose. Ten additional sites will be scheduled to come online between August to December 2023.

Agenda Item 7 – Financials. Ms. Gibbons presented the financials provided in the meeting packet. Mr. Hoban called for questions; no questions at this time.

Agenda Item 8 – Report, Discussion and Action, if any on Live Racing Operations. Mr. Swartzlander reported on three areas specific to live racing operations:

Race Dates & Stabling: Mr. Swartzlander stated that the 2023 purse package being proposed to the TOC includes: 1) keeping overnight purses at 2022 levels, 2) adding an additional stakes race at Pleasanton, possibly creating the biggest day in fair racing, 3) stabling at Pleasanton and Sacramento June through August, 4) retaining the horsemen’s incentives from 2022 while adding an additional \$300 per starter and 5) raising purses \$38,000 at Ferndale in the event that they are allocated their second week of racing without overlap.

Mr. Swartzlander reported that at the upcoming California Horse Racing Board (CHRB) Meeting on March 16, CARF maintains a position seeking two weeks of racing at Humboldt County Fair without overlapped racing at Golden Gate Fields (GGF). CHRB directed the affected parties to reach a financial compromise. That compromise has not been reached.

Mr. Swartzlander stated that if the parties come to the CHRB Board Meeting without reaching a compromise, it is likely the Board will allocate dates similar to 2022 (first week without overlap and second week with overlap).

Mr. Swartzlander reported that the Ferndale Jockey Club hosted Vice-Chairman Oscar Gonzales at Ferndale for a community event planned to showcase the area’s support for horse racing. Mr. Swartzlander deemed the event successful.

Greg Gomes announced that Humboldt County Fair has hired a new Interim General Manager, Jill Duffy. Ms. Duffy has experience as County Supervisor and was previously the executive director of the Humboldt Waste Management Authority for 10 years.

Horse Recruitment: Mr. Doutrich announced that he will be visiting Turf Paradise in Arizona March 25-28. The summer meet in Arizona at Yavapai Downs will not be running in 2023, creating an opportunity to entice those horsemen to ship to the fairs. A copy of the recruitment package is contained in the meeting packet.

Other: Mr. Swartzlander reported that he will be travelling to Southern California for the upcoming CHRB Meeting and will also be meeting with the new president of SEIU, Local 280.

Summary: Current law provides comprehensive regulation of ticket sellers and makes violations of those provisions a misdemeanor. Current law requires a ticket seller to issue a refund upon request to a ticket purchaser for canceled, postponed, or rescheduled events. Existing law also requires a ticket seller to disclose to a purchaser the location of the seat represented by the ticket, as specified. This bill would require a ticket seller to disclose to a purchaser the portion of the ticket price that represents a fee or surcharge and a link to an internet webpage that includes the refund requirements described above.

Summary: Current law requires the California Gambling Control Commission to establish a 10-member Gaming Policy Advisory Committee composed of representatives of controlled gambling licensees and members of the general public in equal numbers. Current law requires the executive director of the commission to convene the committee, from time to time, for the purpose of discussing matters of controlled gambling regulatory policy and any other relevant gambling-related issue. This bill would increase the membership of the committee from 10 to 12 members and would require the additional members to include one representative of academia who possesses knowledge on matters related to gaming and one representative from the bureau. The bill would require the executive director to convene the committee at least twice every calendar year, rather than from time to time.

Summary: Current law requires an amendment to a city or county ordinance relating to a gambling establishment or the Gambling Control Act to be submitted to the Department of Justice for review and

comment before the ordinance is adopted by the city or county. Prior law, until January 1, 2023, prohibited the commission from issuing a gambling license for a gambling establishment that was not licensed to operate on December 31, 1999, except as specified. This bill would reenact that prohibition until January 1, 2043, and would prohibit the commission from issuing a gambling license for a gambling establishment that was not licensed to operate on December 31, 2022, and that is pending before the commission as of January 1, 2024. The bill would also invalidate a gambling license for a gambling establishment that was not licensed to operate on December 31, 2022, and that was issued between December 31, 2022, and January 1, 2024.

Summary: Current law requires that, whenever a fair conducts a program of horse races on which there is parimutuel wagering, the fair, so far as practicable, provide a program of racing that includes thoroughbred racing, quarter horse racing, Arabian racing, and Appaloosa racing, if a sufficient number of horses is available to provide competition in one or more races. Under current law, parimutuel wagering may be conducted on barrel races, show jumping races, and steeplechase races at any public or private facility that has been approved and licensed by the board. Summary: Current law requires the Department of Human Resources to establish and adjust salary ranges for each class of position in the state civil service, subject to any merit limits contained in the California Constitution. Summary: Current law authorizes the California Horse Racing Board to approve minisatellite wagering sites, as defined, under specified conditions. Current law requires an organization formed by associations or fairs to operate the audiovisual signal system to execute a specified agreement with the association conducting a racing meeting and the minisatellite wagering facility that specifies, among other things, the components of its racing program, including live, out-of-zone, out-of-state, and out-of-country races, that an association or fair will make available to the site. This bill would explicitly require the agreement to specify which live in-state races would be provided by the association or fair to the site.

Summary: Current law requires a person who deals, operates, carries on, conducts, maintains, or exposes for play any controlled game in this state, or who receives any compensation or reward, or any percentage or share of the money or property played, for keeping, running, or carrying on any controlled game in this state, to apply for and obtain a valid state gambling license, key employee license, or work permit. Current law provides that an owner of a gambling enterprise is known as the owner-licensee. Under existing law, other persons who also obtain a state gambling license do not receive a separate license certificate, but instead the license of those persons are endorsed on the license certificate that is issued to the owner-licensee. Under current law, a key employee license entitles the holder to work as a key employee in any key employee position at any gambling establishment, provided that the key employee terminates employment with one gambling establishment before commencing work for another. Current law also authorizes a key employee with a valid personal portable license to work as a key employee in any key employee position in more than one gambling establishment and requires the commission to establish a program for portable personal licenses for key employees.
